After 20 Years, Still Saving Babies' Lives

Isaiah, Ruth and Jeremiah are the "Bible names" Angela Silva picked for three babies she chose to bring into the world this summer. Now just over twoand-a-half months old, these triplets are among the most exhilarating and exhausting aspects of their mom's life. Silva is one of nearly 26,000 women who have walked into

the Brooklyn-based Life Center

of New York over the past two decades. This year, the Life Center is celebrating its 20th anniversary serving the five boroughs as a non-profit, non-sectarian crisis center for pregnant women considering abortion

Alternative to Abortion "The Life Center of New York was started 20 years ago by independent men and women with the idea of helping young ladies who are pregnant and

thinking about having an abor-tion. We try to steer them to see an alternative to abortion," said Fred Trabulsi, executive director of the center since August, 2003. He works closely with site manager, Laura Sica, and a staff of full and part-time volunteers who are trained to deal with women in difficult situations.

Pioneer Program

The Life Center of New York was one of the first pro-life cri-

sis centers in New York C when it opened in 1984 una the name Mother and Unborn Baby Love. Visibility and accessibility to public transportation made the brick building on the corner of 68th St. and Fifth Ave. in Bay Ridge/Sunset Park an ideal site. Although the name changed in 1995, the location and mission of saving unborn babies has stayed the same.
